From the Priest in Charge.

This Sunday is one that is known by many names. Some call it *mid-Lent Sunday*, because this is officially the halfway point on our journey to Easter: Three Sundays have passed, and now Easter is in three more Sundays. Some call it *Refreshment Sunday*, because on Mid-Lent Sunday, you got to breathe a bit from the strictness of Lent, and relax from the rules a bit. It is also called *Laetare Sunday*, so named because of the opening words of the Medieval introit, "*Laetare Hierusalem*" or "Rejoice ye with Jerusalem" – from Isaiah 66. All of these names have a common theme: rejoicing in the middle of this season of penitence. From all this rejoicing, some traditions came to exist: the wearing of Rose coloured vestments instead of violet, for example, or the eating of desserts, which was otherwise frowned upon during Lent. There was another tradition which existed on this Sunday, as well, one that became known in the British Isles as "Mothering Sunday".

This British observance is rooted in the scripture for the day: The



introit, to which I already referred, is in its fullness the following: "Rejoice ye with Jerusalem; and be ye glad for her, all ye that delight in her: exult and sing for joy with her, all ye that in sadness mourn for her; that ye may suck, and be satisfied with the breasts of her consolations. Psalm: I was glad when they said unto me, We will go into the house of the Lord." Though this passage from the prophet Isaiah refers directly to the personified Jerusalem, Christian tradition has identified this with the

New Jerusalem in Revelation, and as the Bride of Christ – the Church – the mother of us all.

The British custom on Mothering Sunday for centuries was to go to your "Mother Church" on this Sunday. Your "mother church" was a different place depending on your circumstances. It would normally mean the church in which you were baptized. But if you already go to the church where you were baptized, or if that church was too far away or in another country, you might go to the Cathedral – the mother church of your diocese – or if you didn't really go to church regularly, it might be that you visited your local parish church. The idea was that on Mothering Sunday, everyone had a church to go to. By the turn of the 20th century, most aristocratic households in England would give their staff that weekend off so they could return to their home communities and go to their mother churches with their own mothers. Mother Church, Mothering Sunday.

Of course, as a response to the American "Mother's Day" movement that began in 1913, "Mothering Sunday" in Britain, and in the lands influenced by her, became the British equivalent of what we know as Mother's Day here in North America. So, today is effectively Mother's Day in the U.K., though the Church of England still encourages people to visit the church where they received the sacrament of Baptism.

Here in Fredericton, we celebrate *both* Mothering Sunday now and Mother's Day in May. While May is the commercial holiday, we keep Mothering Sunday for the Church observance of all the maternal figures in our lives and celebrate with the traditional Simnel Cake and hand out flowers.

The Mothers' Union, an organization founded in England in 1876 to support mothers through the often-tumultuous duties of motherhood, and has a special connection to this day, since this is the day customarily used to enroll new members into the Mothers' Union. Though the organization has grown to include many different missions today, their first



responsibility is prayer for families: since prayer is the best tool we have to deal with life's problems.

Our local branch has asked to have the following prayer published and read in church this weekend, and I commend it to your use:

"Creator God, I thank you for the privilege of bringing children into this world and for the gift of new life. Give me your guidance, your love, your strength, on each new day I share with you the nurturing and care of my family, may they grow in stature and in knowledge of you, filled with your wisdom and your joy of living. Amen."
