From the Priest in Charge-



"Could ye not watch with me one hour?" (St. Matthew 26.40)

The church has now entered the last two weeks of Lent which are undoubtedly the two most solemn weeks of the year. The name "Passiontide" has been used to describe it, as these two weeks recall the last days of Jesus'

life before his death on the cross. Throughout this time, we rememember and reenact our Lord's *Passion*: the story of his suffering and death. We start with the entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, and each day in Holy Week we read the Passion Gospels – the accounts of this momentous event.

The Climax of the high drama of the Church's calendar is the Paschal Triduum, the three most holy days: Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Eve/Easter. On these days we remember the Last Supper and new commandment (Latin: *mandatum*) Jesus gave his disciples to remember him; his crucifixion on Good Friday; and the Easter Vigil (properly done at midnight) celebrates the rising from the tomb in glorious fashion. In these three days, each action that we take is steeped in tradition and significance and by them we get to actively participate in the drama of our Salvation.

One of these traditions happens *after* the Maundy Thursday liturgy. Some of you may remember a time (B.C. – *before COVID*) when a "Maundy Thursday Watch", or all-night vigil, would take place. The logic of this is as follows. Following the Eucharist in the Maundy Thursday service, where we commemorate the Last Supper, the church is stripped bare of ornaments as we prepare to commemorate Good Friday – this is reminiscent of our Lord being stripped of his garments before his death. Part of this "stripping" of the Church is the solemn relocation of the Blessed Sacrament that is reserved for distribution to the sick and dying to the "Altar of Repose". Since we believe that the Bread and Wine truly become the Body and Blood of Christ in the Eucharist, we cannot in good conscience leave our Lord in the austerity of the stripped Sanctuary, and

so establish the Altar of Repose as a place of rest and safety. The Altar of Repose is meant to be reminiscent of the Garden of Gethsemane, with flowers and lights. It is a place of beauty that should rightfully inspire the awe of the beholder for our Lord is present there in the Eucharist.

Following the Last Supper, Jesus went out into the Garden of Gethsemane to pray while his disciples stood watch. Jesus knew what was about to take place, and pleaded with his Father to guide him on this difficult path that lay ahead. When Jesus returned to the place where the disciples were, he found them asleep. He said to Peter, "What, could ye not watch with me one hour? Watch and pray, that ye enter not into temptation: the spirit indeed is willing, but the flesh is weak." It is from this conversation that the tradition of the Watch was founded.

The Watch, then, is a way for us to take the place of the disciples and sacrifice an hour of our sleep to sit and pray before the presence of Christ in the Eucharist.

There has been interest expressed in resuming this practice this year, but since we have had a gap of a few years, I am suggesting we perhaps modify the schedule a bit. I propose that this year's watch begins immediately following the Maundy Thursday service at St. Mary's and goes until Midnight. If we get more volunteers, we can go later, but midnight is a good goal to start with. To this end, a sign-up sheet will be available in the Narthex for volunteers. If you are a member of the Parish of Marysville, and would like to participate, please let me know.

Even if you can't participate at Church this year, I encourage you to spend an hour in silence at home that night, reading, praying, and basking in the presence of God. It isn't meant to be easy or routine. It is a time to be in conversation with God. While it may be a challenge, it can be a wonder-filled, grace-filled blessing.
